About DFLI

DFLI is a competitive program aimed at creating future nonprofit leaders. It is led by the members of the Advancement Division and the Center for Nonprofit Management in the Mission Division at Stonehill College.

This semester-long program encourages students to expand their knowledge of development and acquire the skillset necessary to achieve a successful and rewarding career in the nonprofit sector.

Graduates of this program are well poised to provide much-needed fundraising support to a variety of nonprofit organizations.



LEARNING MODULES

Students accepted into DFLI rotate through weekly learning modules taught by seasoned fundraising professionals in the Advancement Division of Stonehill College.

These modules address a range of development and advancement topics, such as:

- Annual Giving
- Communications and Media Relations
- Corporate and Foundation Relations
- Development Research
- Maior Gifts
- Special Events and Stewardship

WORKSHOPS

Throughout the semester, students also participate in workshops led by the staff at the Center for Nonprofit Management. These serve as check points for students to take on additional learnings and express feedback.

Students first receive an outline of the program, an overview of nonprofit basics, and training in various research databases. They are then provided with guidance and the opportunity to learn about various careers available in the nonprofit sector.

Students then put their newly acquired skills and knowledge of philanthropy to the test by creating and executing fundraising strategies in the third workshop, the Donor-Nonprofit Networking Challenge.

The semester closes with a final gathering to celebrate the students' hard work and accomplishments!
