## The following includes the trips Stonehill students are taking as participants in the 2014 H.O.P.E. Service Immersion Program.

\*The number next to the location indicates the number of students participating.

**Ware**: (11) In Ware Massachusetts we will be working with the Agape community to learn about sustainable living and practicing Christian non-violence. The students will work Agape's farm and immerse themselves in the Agape lifestyle of composting, fueling their "veggie car" and many other sustainable practices.

**West Virginia**: (15) In West Virginia students will work with The Appalachian Institute while encountering and learning about the social justice issues ranging from those surrounding mountain top removal, fracking, access to healthy food, and addiction.

**Tennessee**: (17) HOPE Tennessee will have the great opportunity of serving the Cocke and Servire county communities through Sunset Gap Community Center. We will be assisting them in home reconstruction for underprivileged families that would not be able to finance or execute these repairs otherwise. Other services and programs that this community center supplies include, but certainly are not limited to, food pantries, thrift shops, and bible camps.

**Kentucky**: (10) The HOPE Kentucky group will be working with the Christian Appalachian Project to repair and construct homes in Eastern Kentucky. We will be split into groups and will work with one family for the entire week so we can learn about their stories and create strong relationships. At the end of the week all of the families we have worked with come together with the volunteers to have a meal and share our experiences with one another.

**Portland**: (9) This trip focuses on the social justice issue of hunger and homelessness. Volunteers will mainly serve with the hospitality ministry at St. Andre Bessette Church in downtown Portland. Some of the community programs run by St. Andre include an art program, a foot care program, a food pantry, and fellowship groups. Volunteers will also to engage in service with the following organizations: Operation Nightwatch, Central City Concern, and L'Arche Portland. During the week long service immersion trip, students will learn about poverty in the Portland area and build community with those who are hungry, homeless, mentally ill, recovering from drug addiction and abuse, and living with intellectual and developmental disabilities. – *Andrea Maroun '14, Portland Student Leader* 

**NOLA**: (18) HOPE New Orleans will be working with the St. Bernard Project and will not only learn about, but also improve the social justice issue of homelessness. After Hurricane Katrina hit this area about 9 years ago, the effects are still being felt today by these people. While on our trip, we will interact with the justice issue of homelessness physically and emotionally. With the family we'll be serving, we'll have the opportunity to hear their story and provide physical labor to improve their homes as well.

The Romero Center, a retreat center focused on catholic social teaching, is the organization we stayed with, bringing Stonehill students and students from other colleges and universities together in order to share and reflect on what we were experiencing at our service sites on a daily basis.
